NAICS was developed under the auspices of the U.S. Office of Management and Budget (OMB), and adopted in 1997 to replace the Standard Industrial Classification (SIC) system. It has been updated every 5 years (2002, 2007 and 2012) to reflect changing, new and emerging economic activities.

NAICS is an industry classification system that groups establishments (businesses) into industries based on the similarity of their production processes.

Industry

Industry is the primary type of activity at a person's place of work. Industry employment refers to all the occupations in a firm or industry group. Each industry employs a variety of occupations. For example, occupations in the manufacturing industry could include machine operators and tenders, systems analysts, sales agents, administrators and office workers, and cafeteria workers.






Wyoming, Annual Average Employment, 2011



Long-Term Industry Projections thru 2021


Colorado, Annual Percent Growth & Total Employment Growth
